


THOUGHTS FROM THE DESK of... **Rev. Teresa** Stewart–Sykes

December is the month for Christmas preparations, too much chocolate and too much turkey! January is the month for getting over Christmas; for Slimming World and cutting down on the booze!

Most of us begin December with good intentions to be more restrained in our festive celebrations and to find more time for the simpler pleasures of spending time with family and showing our kids that Christmas isn't just about presents. Even so, like most people by the middle of December I am happily dragged into the frenzy of Christmas shopping and wondering if I've got enough food to feed everyone on Christmas Day!

But not everyone finds the months of December and January a time of celebration. For some, these dark winter months are a time to remember those they have lost who are no longer around. For others who struggle with physical or mental ill health, the Christmas season can be particularly difficult.

Winterborne St Martin PARISH COUNCIL

Firstly, we must publish an apology as somehow my seemingly controversial draft of 12th September was published in Cllr Hutchings name, and we all agree that it is unfair that he gets the blame for my thoughts. I certainly don't mind clarifying this as I stand by my words and sentiments and was annoyed that they were attributed elsewhere.

Again, it's odd drafting weeks before publication because much of the PC's activity is currently focussed on things that will have reached fruition before this is published. I had previously mentioned our Budget and this will have been taken by Council on the 27th of November; this can still be amended, particularly when our out-turn is known, but it is this budget that determines the amount we charge in precept. Secondly, I have been party to a campaign to have the PC repay at least some of the monies spent by a parishioner on maintaining the defibrillator – again the PC will have considered the grant application on the 27th.

Also, things are coming to a head with the Memorial Hall/Reading Room, a building which we do not own but for which we have submitted a claim of possessory title. Ownership is complex as it is actually held in ancient Trust, but I've learned that nothing is simple around here! The PC has had a Working Group dealing with this for some time and through their efforts it is clear that the building is in a much worse state of repair than was feared. I have previously described the CIL monies we hold and we have previously published (in, reports and minutes, and at the Annual Parish Meeting) the possibility or even probability of spending substantial amounts on refurbishing the building. To date we have received no feedback and I suspect that the Working Group will have redoubled efforts to consult Parishioners on proposed expenditure on the building.

Finally, it's pothole season and several of us lost tyres last winter. As this is the last publication before Christmas, I think it only right to thank the team that put this magazine together, and particularly Graham for his sterling efforts each month. And whilst I'm on the subject of thanks, it's great to see a new parishioner pick up and run with Advent Calander, now surely a fixture in Martinstown. One behalf of the Council and our Clerk can I wish you all a Merry Christmas and hope that many of you will be celebrating the beginning of a new year full of hope.

Community Asset Transfer

The first stage of the Community Asset Transfer application to Dorset Council for a lease on the 10 acres of land north of St Martinsfield and the Church, has been approved by the Council. After a recent meeting with Sam Hoida of DCs Estates Department to answer some of our questions regarding access and covenants etc, we feel it is now appropriate to continue with the Business and Management plans. We have 6 months to complete the plans and will work in conjunction with the Estates department to make sure it meets expectations. We have a team of 5 people working on the plans. We will keep you updated with developments through these pages. Dorset COP 2

Four of us from Green Martinstown attended the second Dorset COP (Conference of the Parties)

Many of the 200 or so Dorset groups working towards sustainability, mitigation of climate change, adaptation and resilience to the effects of climate change were present. This year the event was held at Bournemouth University and was bigger again. With over 100 organisations represented and 350 individuals - the University was buzzing!

There were 8 workshops on subjects like transport, energy, food production. There were creative workshops, business related sessions, a speakers corner a community exhibition and many opportunities to network. Green Martinstown had a small display.

Community Garden at the Vicarage

We have been in conversation with Rev. Teresa Stuart-Sykes, our relatively recent incumbent at the Vicarage. Theresa has a hope that part of the garden at the Vicarage becomes a community garden. The east end of the garden is secluded and accessible from the east, therefore not impinging on her privacy. There is space for growing vegetables and flowers and a space just to be. However, what emerges will be dependent on what the villagers want. So if you are interested please let us know.

Emails

While we all know wasting food, energy and water is expensive not only financially but also for our planet many of us do not consider our consumption of technology. You might be surprised to know that emails and cloud storage affect CO2 emissions. The average carbon footprint of an email is 0.3g CO2e. The numbers go up, however, if it's a long email that takes ten minutes to write and three seconds to read (17g CO2e), or if it's got one image or an attachment (50g CO2e), or is sent to multiple recipients. Source Google. It is therefore important not to use 'reply all' unnecessarily and better IT etiquette and less wasteful to delete unnecessary chain messages. Or start afresh and avoid wasteful lazy habits.

Further savings can be made by reducing unwanted subscriptions both online and through the post. The power of unsubscribe, usually found at the base of an email, and required by law, is liberating. A quick phone call to mail order catalogue companies, saves trees, water, print production and postage van delivery services. The businesses concerned are only too happy to update their mailing lists. It's a win win for all concerned.

I will learn about the conservation work happening here to protect these endangered species. I will also take part in beach cleans and lots more.
