During February we enjoy the annual celebration of which is Valentine's Day

Of course, love and a loving relationship takes many different forms. In our society we see a wonderful diversity of expressions of love which reflect the joyful differences between us and how we interact and live with one another. "Then - bliss - we were given a machine that no longer required me to make a wax master, but would print from a typed copy. My grandchildren loved helping by pushing the buttons and Charlie in particular liked watching the sheets flying out the other end. I enjoyed producing the Newsletter and (was) glad to be of service to the Church and the Village."

How times have changed. Now, if I keep de-cluttering, I hope to find a copy of one of those old Newsletters ...!

Leaving small electrical devices on charge overnight has been the cause of multiple house fires in recent years, so Dorset & Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Service is urging people to 'Unplug to Unwind'.

Only large appliances such as fridges are designed to be left switched on all the time, so ensuring that everything else is unplugged before you go to bed is a simple routine that could protect your home from fire.

To help reduce the risk of a fire in your home,

take these simple steps:

- Make sure an electrical appliance has a British or European safety mark when you buy it. Only buy your electrical chargers from a reputable source.
- Never leave items on charge when you are sleeping or when you are not at home.
- · Don't overload sockets.
- Regularly check for frayed or worn cables and wires.
- Buy your electrical chargers from a reputable source.
- Register your appliances to receive notification of safety alerts or product recalls at www.registermyappliance.org.uk

FEB '25

'Come on in, the waters lovely'

Not exactly, but I'm pleased I have done it. Joined the Parish Council.

It was never something I thought of, feeling that it needed younger, more dynamic people. The catalyst was when I heard that the PC wasn't able to give a grant to a parishioner who had funded replacement pads and batteries for the defibrillator and then more or less simultaneously, on Facebook, a rumour that the electricity to the milk machine was in question. Neither of these fitted with my idea of what a Parish Council was about.

'Put up or shut up' I reflected

So, I put up and was elected at the November meeting last year alongside another new councillor. Pleasingly, at that meeting, after debate, the Council voted to reimburse the parishioner for the expenses on the defibrillator. And the milk machine will keep its electricity. A decision for common sense and practicality in the service of the community.

At the meeting in December another Councillor was elected, bringing the total to eight, only one short of the nine allowed.

There is much more to discuss and decide on, not least the future ownership of the Meeting Room/Reading Room. Going forward what use it could be put to. This is a community decision, and views

would be very welcome. It was initially built as a reading room for parishioners and as a place to commemorate the soldiers who lost their lives in the war. It would be nice to find some similar appropriate use for it.

A much clearer picture has also emerged regarding the Grant obtained during Covid times for the Reading Room. This was not a Parish Council application.

Sadly, our very competent clerk Victoria has decided to leave us, for personal reasons. The search is on for a replacement. It is an important role and one that we need to fill quickly.

I have realised even in my brief tenure that there is much more to being a councillor than I had imagined. Also, I can see that the council is composed of people wishing to do their best for the community, with different views of course. It wouldn't do if we agreed on everything!

If you have an opinion on something or there is something not right in the village, why not write to us or come along to a meeting. The councillors are there to serve the community.

And finally, there is still a vacancy, the gender balance is heavily weighed.

The water may not be exactly warm, but the waves are calming down, and actually it's quite fun.

FASHION COSTS THE EARTH

For many who say 'I have so many clothes I don't know what I've got' I invite you to reconsider. Continuous consumerism is wrecking our planet and fashion is a key culprit. I was shocked by Stacey Dooley's documentary on how much water is used to make one cotton jacket, 10,330 litres, which is the equivalent of enough drinking water for one person for 24 years. As Stacey says, 'It's not that people don't care, they don't know'. We live in an age where online shopping is so easy and for some compulsive. With these statistics we need to change our habits now!

Man made fibres fare no better making the garment industry the second worst polluter. Toxic chemicals and by-products are polluting the waterways mainly in developing countries where water is often scarce and sanitation rare. In addition, child labour and modern-day slavery abound. The endless churn of cheap clothing that ends up in landfills or on far flung beaches adds to the environmental impact that we are all responsible for.

Gulp say 60% of textiles are now made from plastic fibres. Every time we turn on the washing machine 700,000 plastic fibres are released into the water ways. 'These microfibres are one of the largest sources of microplastic pollution in our oceans ending up in our food chain and ultimately our bloodstream. gulp.online based in Bristol are developing a filter to deal with this crucial issue.

At COP Dorset I was delighted to meet Jennifer Morisetti of Hawkers Farm Stour Provost www. hawkersfarm.org. She runs workshops on upcycling, mending and has a 'Wear Me out Clothing Library', where you can borrow occasion clothes, including handbags and hats. For me there is no shame in wearing the same clothes until they are threadbare, or moth holed knitwear, buying from charity shops rather than dumping unwanted clothes. Wearing what you have differently, engaging with imaginative combinations. Becoming part of the change could be fun, either way our future depends on it.

The first day back at work after the Christmas excesses is always hard going. It is the same for the first walk in January. First you have to find a pub which is open mid-week and then plan a route which has not been seasonally affected. Our pub was the Royal Oak in Milborne St Andrew and our route was 90% mud free despite the previous two days rain.

You know its not your day when, before leaving the Village Green, a car runs over your foot. Shortly afterwards you are told your meal has not been ordered at the pub but not to worry. Maybe this was the reason why you would then decide to throw yourself into one of the only mud puddles on route!

The gentle descent to Houghton was eclipsed by a short up hill bit. You know this because the banter, laughing and chatter stops, the heavy breathing takes over and the line strings out to twice the length. At the top, the mood changes back again, due to the picturesque views but more probably due to the knowledge that we were on the homeward leg. One last surprise was that a lake had appeared across the footpath overnight.

I say one last surprise but, as we raced for the pub and lunch, our way was blocked by a recently erected 'Road Closed' sign. We managed to find a way around the closure only to see a sign at the far end which said 'Road Closed. Find your own route'. Thank you Open Reach for being so helpful, 6 vans not a single workman in sight'. A challenging walk, completed by 17 intrepid walkers, who after a good lunch, fully deserved an afternoon nap.




